#### **2003** November Election Results

Eighty-one (81) total new millage levies and eighty-five (85) renewal millage levies were submitted by Ohio school districts in the November 4, 2003 election. Voters approved twenty-two (22) or 27% of the new millage levies and seventy (70) or 82% of the renewal millage levies.

Of the fifty-eight (58) bond issues on the ballot, school districts represented the majority with fifty-three (53) followed by three (3) townships, one (1) city and one (1) village issue. Of these, thirty-three (33) were considered large - \$10,000,000 or greater, seven (7) were considered intermediate - \$5,000,000 to \$9,999,999 and eighteen were considered small – less than \$5,000,000. Voters approved twenty-two (22) of the fifty-eight (58) issues. The volume approved was \$316,214,460 or 31% of the total volume submitted (\$1,024,530,695).

The following tables show the results of the bond issues and school district tax levies submitted at the November 4, 2003 election. The results were compiled with the assistance of the County Boards of Election, and the office of the Secretary of State.

#### **Bond Issues**




## **Year End Statistics**



## Volume of Bond Sales in 2003 - SUBDIVISION






#### Volume of Bond Sales in 2003 - DEBT TYPE
